### Third Sunday of Advent

### December 17, 2023

**Reader 1:** When God's people were surrounded by hardship, suffering, and grief, Isaiah proclaimed,

The spirit of the Lord GOD is upon me, because the LORD has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners; to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor, and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all who mourn; to provide for those who mourn in Zion—to give them a garland instead of ashes, the oil of gladness instead of mourning, the mantle of praise instead of a faint spirit (Isaiah 61:1-3a).

**Reader 2:** We come today as people who are also surrounded by suffering and grief. And yet, the Spirit hovers among us, tending and anointing, inspiring freedom where there is captivity, declaring blessing in places the world has cursed, and igniting fierce joy where mourning and heartache prevail.

**Congregation:** We wait as people who experience hardship and pain, yet we are called to witness to the persistent joy that sustains our life as God's people.

**Reader 1:** We light these candles as signs of our shocking hope, just peace, and fierce joy. May our lives shine with the fierce, tenacious joy of the Light who lives in our hearts as we wait and work for the coming of God's kin-dom on earth as it is in heaven. Amen.

Light three candles of the Advent wreath – the two previously lit purple ones and the pink candle.


#### ANNOUNCEMENTS

# Christ in Christmas



The Christmas star symbolizes the star of Bethlehem, which shone on the night Jesus was born and later guided the three kings, or wise men, to the baby Jesus. The star is also the heavenly sign of a prophecy fulfilled long ago and the shining hope for humanity, and it symbolizes the Christ is the light of the world and is a shining hope to all mankind.

"Where is the new born king of the Jews? For we have seen his star in the east, and have come to worship him." Matthew 2:2



A candle, a mirror of starlight, is also a symbol representing the star of Bethlehem. The Christmas candle reminds us that Jesus is the light of the world. He is the light we should follow and through Him we will find our way in the darkness of life, and also be a light to others.

To give light to them that sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace. Luke 1:79



The men who brought their gifts to honor the birth of Jesus inspired the concept of giving gifts during the holiday. The Christmas gift reminds us of how God gave us the gift of His Son and that Jesus Christ gave us

the greatest gift of all. Giving gifts is meant to be a symbol of love and kindness and remembrance of the gift of eternal life made possible by the Savior.

... And when they had opened their treasures, they presented him gifts: gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Matthew 2:11



Made with holly and evergreens symbolizing eternal life, the Christmas wreath is circular, a symbol of the never ending love of God – having no beginning and no ending. The Christmas wreath also represents the crown of thorns that Jesus wore when he was crucified.

The soldiers made a crown of long sharp thorns and put it on his head  $\dots$  John 19:2



At Christmas, bells proclaim the arrival of the season announcing the birth of Jesus. Church bells call us to worship. They guide lost sheep back to the fold.

For the Son of man came to seek, and to save that which was lost. Luke 19:10



Candy canes depict the shape of a shepherd's crook. Jesus was often referred to as the Good Shepherd. His birth was God's way to bring lost lambs back to the fold. The red stripe represents blood, Christ's sacrifice, and the white stands for his purity.

And there were in the same country shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. Luke 2:8




Poinsettias are our Christmas flower. The story of the poinsettia begins in the plant's native Mexico, where a legend says humble weeds left by a poor girl as an offering to baby Jesus at a nativity scene miraculously turned into the gorgeous flower. The local people referred to the beautiful blooms as "Flowers of the Holy Night." The first U.S.

ambassador to Mexico, Joel Roberts Poinsett, first saw the flowers in a Christmas Eve church service and was given seeds from the plant by the priest. He brought the plants that were later named after him to the States.

















